Expedited review claimed:

- ___ 1. The study of existing data, documents, records, pathological specimens, or diagnostic specimens.
- ___ 2. Research on individual or group behavior or characteristics of individuals, such as studies of perception, cognition, game theory, or test development, where the investigator does not manipulate the subjects' behavior and the research will not involve stress to subjects. Research involving sensitive matters such as sexual, religious, or political behavior may require full review. Expedited review IS NOT appropriate if subjects' responses, if known outside of the research, could place them at risk of civil or criminal liability or damage their financial standing or employability.
- ___ 3. Research on drugs or devices for which an investigational new drug exemption is not required.
- ___ 4. Voice recordings made for research purposes such as investigations of speech defects.
- ___ 5. Moderate exercise by health volunteers.
- ___ 6. Collection of hair and nail clippings, in a non-disfiguring manner; deciduous teeth; and permanent teeth if patient care indicates a need for extraction.
- ___ 7. Collection of excreta and external secretions including sweat, uncannulated saliva, placenta removed at delivery, and amniotic fluid at the time of rupture of the membrane prior to or during labor.
- ___ 8. Recording of data from subjects using noninvasive procedures routinely employed in clinical practice. This includes the use of physical sensors that are applied either to the surface of the body or at a distance and do not involve input of matter or significant amounts of energy into the subject or an invasion of the subjects' privacy. It also includes such procedures as weighing, testing sensory acuity, electrocardiography, electroencephalography, thermography,

detection of naturally occurring radioactivity, diagnostic echography, and electromagnetic radiation outside the visible range (for example, x-rays, microwaves).

- ____ 9. Collection of blood samples by venipuncture, in amounts not exceeding 450 milliliters in an eight-week period and no more than two times per week, from subjects who are in good health and not pregnant.**
- ____ 10. Collection of both supra-and subgingival dental plaque and calculus, provided the procedure is not more invasive than a routine prophylactic scaling of the teeth and the process is accomplished in accordance with accepted prophylactic techniques.**

EXPEDITED REVIEW IS NOT ALLOWED for research involving persons under the age of 18 years except for collections which are part of the usual diagnostic or therapeutic regimen of children. A full review is required for these projects.
