Thesis Mon-thesis Option:



The Masters of Science (M.S) degree pro-gram in Criminal Justice is designed to prepare students for professional careers within the criminal justice system. Theoretical, methodological and philosophical understanding of the criminal justice system is stressed during the matriculation process. <u>Specialty Areas:</u>

In addition to core courses, students must complete 9 semester hours in one of the four specialty areas: Law Enforcement, Corrections, Forensic Sciences and Public Administration. Coursework six years or older cannot be applied to the Master of Science in Criminal Justice degree.
