Dear Child Care Providers:

Now that summer has arrived, the number of outdoor events you'll want to plan for the infants, toddlers, and youngsters in your care will certainly increase. Realizing that you'll be preoccupied by complicated logistics while organizing high-quality field trips and outside playtime, we want to be sure that protecting child health and safety during those activities also remains top of mind.

<u>DECAL's Rules and Regulations</u> for providers include detailed and helpful guidelines for avoiding situations in which children could be harmed, including instructions for transporting them safely; maintaining a safe playground area; supervising them in water; and avoiding dehydration, heat exhaustion, and sunburn. We've also prepared <u>training modules</u> to help you comply with rules governing the new background check process that more comprehensively scans crime, fingerprint, and abuse databases to identify people who pose a threat to children. If you have questions or need guidance regarding any of these requirements, please contact your Child Care Services licensing consultant.

At this time of year, when the heat index in Georgia soars to unsafe levels, I'm especially focused on vehicular heatstroke risk. During FY2018, 12 children were left in vehicles by child care providers statewide. So far in FY2019, it has happened to 10 children. Thankfully they all survived. But one child left unattended in a vehicle is one child too many, and there is absolutely no reason for a child to suffer or die in these conditions. That's why DECAL and several other state agencies continue to promote the "Look Again" campaign that asks care providers, teachers, and family members to stay alert to the dangers of leaving children unattended in vehicles and to be thorough in accounting for every child in their care as they are transported from place to place. It's a simple, but effective process: When you arrive at your destination, check all areas inside the front and back of your vehicle, and after you've looked—just to be sure—look again.

By committing to "Look Again" and abiding by all of the other health and safety rules DECAL has put in place, we can give children a season of fun-filled outdoor learning experiences while keeping them out of harm's way.

How do Teacher-Child Ratios affect ERS scores?

Although none of the Environmental Rating Scales (ERS) require specific teacher-child ratios, scores for items that are measured within the scales are impacted by teacher-child ratios. Teacher-child ratios impact almost all scale items in some way because ratios impact supervision, teacher-child relationships, and the quality and intentionality of teaching taking place.

"Teacher-child ratios" are the measurement for how many children per teacher are in each classroom. For example, if there is 1 teacher and 10 toddlers, the ratio would be 1:10, but if there were 2 teachers in that same class with 10 toddlers, the ratio would be 1:5 or 2:10.

High teacher-child ratios make it difficult to earn high ERS scores because teachers have more children to teach, and it is noticeably tougher to get all the routines and play done, while still providing high quality teaching interactions with all children. Low teacher-child ratios make it easier to earn higher ERS scores because more teachers allow for easier supervision and sharing of classroom responsibilities, which gives teachers more time to take advantage of opportunities to intentionally teach throughout the day.

Items Potentially Impacted by Teacher-Child Ratios in all ERS Scales used in QR

Items Potentially Impacted by Teacher-Child Ratios
4-23, 25-33
4, 5, 8-35
5, 7-23, 25, 27-34
14, 17-19, 22-32, 37, 42

As you can see, teacher-child ratios have the potential to dramatically impact scores, either positively or negatively. Lower teacher-child ratios typically provide a positive benefit and higher scores in scale items. Higher teacher-child ratios often result in lower scores in scale items. The reason for this is that all the ERS scales have items and indicators to measure the quality of teaching interactions, and the scales emphasize the need for positive teacher-child relationships. Those relationships provide the foundation for the quality and intentional teaching that occurs in high quality early childhood classrooms.

Additionally, earning higher ERS scores results in higher overall star-ratings and increases the amount of compensation that programs receive for enrolled children who utilize CAPS subsidies. Programs receive a tiered quality bonus for all CAPS payments based upon star rating earned: 10% for 1-star, 20% for 2-stars, and 40% for 3-stars. Families at Quality Rated providers also receive a 15% discount on their family fee. Moreover, in order to continue to receive Childcare and Parent Services (CAPS) funding, eligible providers must be Quality Rated by December 31, 2020.

However, the potential benefits of lower teacher-child ratios do not stop at higher QR outcomes and higher compensation.

- Lower teacher-child ratios help improve staff retention rates. When teachers have more support in the classroom, they often feel more satisfied with their work overall.
- Less teacher turnover can reduce the costs and time associated with training new employees, which when coupled with the higher quality bonuses for CAPS families can also help offset the expense of hiring more teachers.

- More staff retention can also increase the continuity of care the children receive, which helps to improve
 child outcomes. It also increases child and family satisfaction, which can increase your retention rate for
 children enrolled.
- Fewer children are suspended or expelled when there are lower teacher-child ratios.

Lower teacher-child ratios provide the needed support for increased and sustainable quality, promote positive teacher-child relationships, improve child outcomes, improve work climate for program staff, and enhance the overall experience for teachers, children, and families. All those benefits positively impact Quality Rated outcomes, but most importantly, positively impact the education and future of Georgia's children.

Tips for Using the SCHOOL-AGE ENVIRONMENT RATING SCALE

• Be sure there are interest areas with a clearly defined purpose.

Interest areas should be conveniently equipped and promote independent use by the children. Interest areas that should be available for use include: arts and crafts, blocks and construction, drama and theater, language and reading, math and reasoning, and science and nature. If homework is part of the program, there must be a separate area that has suitable furniture and provides a quiet space.

• Be sure that materials in the program are accessible.

To be considered accessible, children must be able to reach and use materials by themselves during the times that the materials are available for use. If materials are stored in closed spaces, they can be considered accessible only if it is observed that children can freely access and use the materials when allowed. This access must be provided as part of the usual daily routine, with few exceptions.

• Arts and crafts are not the same thing.

Even though school-age children are able to follow instructions and patterns to create a specific craft project such as a wallet or bracelet, they should have a variety of art materials accessible for free choice to use for individual expression on a daily basis. Craft projects should only be used occasionally.

• Remember to follow proper handwashing procedures.

Handwashing for children and adults requires that both hands be washed with liquid soap and rinsed thoroughly under warm running water for at least ten seconds. Hands should be dried with individual paper towels that are not shared. Using antiseptic waterless washes, gloves, or wipes does not count as a substitute for handwashing. If the same sink is used for handwashing and food-related routines, it must be sanitized after toileting use by spraying the sink and faucets with a bleach-water solution.

Don't forget to use proper procedures for meals and snacks.

Tables should be washed with a soap/water solution, dried with a paper towel, and then sanitized with a bleach-water solution before and after being used for meals and snacks. The bleach-water solution must be allowed to sit for at least ten seconds before being wiped dry. Children should not be allowed to eat snack on the floor and food should not be placed directly on the table surface without a plate, paper towel, or napkin.

• An outdoor area should be used for daily gross motor activities year-round, weather permitting.

"Weather permitting means almost every day, unless there is active precipitation, or extremely hot or cold conditions. Weather does not permit outside activity for children when there are public announcements that advise people to remain indoors due to weather conditions such as high levels of pollution, extreme cold or heat that might cause health problems. After bad weather, staff should check the outdoor area before children go out, dry off equipment, sweep away water, block off puddles, and so forth, as needed. Programs with protected outdoor areas, such as a deck or patio are more likely to be able to meet the requirements for allowing outdoor activity daily, weather permitting.

• Be aware of potential safety issues.

Medicines and other hazardous substances must be kept in a locked storage space; evacuation procedures must be practiced monthly at a time when school-age children are present; parents must be notified if their child is absent without prior notification; and parents must be required to notify staff if their child will be late or absent. First Year Training Requirements

- First year training begins at the staff's hire date and ends at the first year anniversary of employment.
- Example: Hire date: 5/1/14 First Year Anniversary: 5/1/15

First year training should be completed by 5/1/15.

When the program has a licensing study in 2016, the consultant will review the staff's first year training to ensure the required ten hours (10) were completed between 5/1/14 and 5/1/15.

- All caregiver staff are required to obtain a minimum of ten (10) clock hours of training during their first year of employment. At least six (6) of those hours should be obtained in the following topics:
 - Four (4) clock hours of training in any of the following topics: disease control, cleanliness, basic hygiene, illness detection, illness disposition, and childhood injury control.
 - o Two (2) clock hours of training in identifying, reporting, and meeting the needs of abused, neglected, or deprived children. 591-1-1-.33(2)(a)-(b)
- During the first year of employment, the Director and the person primarily responsible for food preparation are required to obtain a minimum of four (4) clock hours of training in food nutrition planning, preparation, serving, proper dish washing, and food storage. 591-1-1-.33(3)

Ongoing/Annual Trainings

- Ongoing/Annual training begins the January after the first year anniversary of employment and ends in December of that calendar year.
- Example: Hire date: 5/1/14 First Year Anniversary: 5/1/15
 - The staff's 2016 annual training should be completed between January and December of 2016 and would be evaluated at the licensing study in 2017. *Note: Due to transition from first year training requirements (hire date to hire date) to ongoing training based on a calendar year, training hours completed between the two time periods, from 5/1/15 to 12/31/15, would also be accepted to count toward the 2016 required ten hours of ongoing annual training.
- After the first year of training, ten hours (10) of ongoing/annual training should be completed each subsequent year of employment (January through December).
- Note: The first year training requirements that specify particular topics do not apply to
 Family Child Care Learning Home providers. Family Child Care Learning Home providers
 are required to complete 20 hours of pre-service training before submitting an initial
 application for a Family Child Care Learning Home registration. Only information about
 annual training requirements applies to Family Child Care Learning Home providers.
