Thesis Mon-thesis Option:

fter passing a comprehensive examination, students must choose to complete either a thesis or non-thesis option to finish their degree requirements. Those who choose a thesis option will be required to take six semester hours of coursework and to complete the requirement of the thesis.

The Masters of Science (M.S) degree program in Criminal Justice is designed to prepare students for professional careers within the criminal justice system. Theoretical, methodological and philosophical understanding of the criminal justice system is stressed during the matriculation process. As a result students are well prepared for careers in criminal justice. Those seeking advanced graduate education beyond the Master's degree level, will be able to compete successfully with graduates from other schools and disciplines. The M.S. in Criminal Justice program requires a 30 hours of classroom study and thesis research. In addition, all students must successfully complete a comprehensive examination. We also offer a fully online M.S. degree in Criminal Justice.

Philosophy

The philosophy and objectives embraced by the Institute are to educate students in such a

Admissions Requirements

The admission requirements are the following:

(1) Baccalaureate degree from an accredited college or university; (2)Official transcripts; (3) Grade point average of 2.50; (4)Applicants whose undergraduate degree was not in criminal justice is required to complete 6 semester hours in undergraduate criminal justice courses; (5)Two letters of recommendations; (6) Graduate Record Exam (GRE) or Miller Analogy Test (MAT) scores

For regular admission GRE Score of 800 (verbal and quantitative) or MAT score of 44 (402).

For provisional admission GRE score of 700 (verbal and quantitative) or MAT score of 27-43.
