On behalf of the faculty and staff of the ASU Department of Counseling & Educational Leadership, it is my pleasure to write this introduction to the latest issue of our newsletter. We are particularly pleased to welcome Dr. Shawn Davidson to our staff. He joined us in September 2014 and you will read more about him later.

Educational Leadership has been and continues to be busy with many initiatives – NCATE,/CAEP research, recruitment, attendance and presentations at conferences, teaching classes, program review and more.

Currently, we are redesigning both the master's and specialist in leadership. The new masters will be a 36 semester hour program with a heavy emphasis on instructional leadership-not management. If approved, we will offer our first classes during the summer of 2016. You'll be pleased to know that, unlike the last five years, students completing the master's program will

receive certification from Georgia Professional Standards Commission (PSC). We'll tell you more about the specialist in our next newsletter.

The Educational Leadership program at ASU has a key position throughout southwest Georgia, the state, region and country as over 300 of our graduates over the past 10 years have assumed positions as superintendents, principals, assistant principals, supervisors, athletic vocational directors and, central office personnel, as well as other leadership positions and roles in educational leadership. Productivity as shown by the number of educational leaders produced; viability by meeting a need in Georgia and the country for all educational leaders, and especially to meet an acute need for minority educational leaders; centrality as the ASU Educational Leadership philosophy is congruent with the ASU Mission and Strategic Plan.

NCATE NEWS

The Continuous Improvement Commission of the Council for the Accreditation of Educator Preparation (CAEP) at its April 26-30, 2015 meeting in Bethesda, Maryland, approved NCATE reaccreditation for the College of Education at Albany State University at the initial teacher preparation and advanced preparation levels. This accreditation decision indicates that the unit and its programs meet rigorous standards set forth by the professional education community.

The Commission also made a distinct decision to recognize that ASU is moving toward it's designated target.

All Educator Preparation Units are required to choose one of six standards to reach target level and ASU chose Standard 2, which addresses, "Having an assessment that collects and analyzes data and uses data for program improvement."

Thanks to all who helped us reach this milestone. This was a collaborative effort with our faculty, staff, advisory councils, local and state school partners and many more too numerous to name.

Special thanks goes to Dr. Kimberly Fields who led us to this magnificent victory!
