


#### **Albany State University Mission (continued)**

U.S. News & World Report released this year's list of top ranked colleges and universities. Albany State University is listed among the top Historically Black Colleges and Universities in the nation. Previously unranked, ASU made the cut at number 15 among all public HBCUs nationally. According to the rankings released today, ASU pulled ahead of Georgia's public HBCUs Fort Valley State University and Savannah State University. The rankings are based on graduation and retention rates, peer assessments, the student to faculty ratio, admission test scores, the strength of the faculty and alumni giving, among other measures of academic excellence.





#### Fall 2014 Enrollment by Metro Atlanta Counties




## Full-Time Equivalent (FTE) Enrollment Five Year Comparison

  - From 3,878 to 3,567




## First-Time, Full-Time Freshmen Enrollment Five Year Comparison

  - From 507 to 424




## **Undergraduate Enrollment Five Year Comparison**

  - From 3,661 to 3,316




## **Graduate Enrollment Five Year Comparison**

  - From 600 to 594




#### Fall 2014 Total Enrollment by Colleges






