#### Criminal Justice


#### Grants resident in the Department:

#### Fine Arts

- After an extensive fund-raising campaign, Albany State university Marching Band director Michael Decuir led the band to a rousing performance in the Tournament of Roses Parade in January 2016.
- Dr. Mimi Noda (Music) completed the summer term in Japan as a part of the ASU Study Abroad Program and developed a reciprocal program for Japanese students.
- Dr. Florence Lyons (Speech and Theatre) developed relationships with several Universities (UCLA, Gordon, and University of Pittsburgh), that has afforded ASU students opportunities to internship at their schools with the opportunity for future graduated study.
- Dr. Marcia Hood, (Fine Arts, chair) served as guest conductor for the Heritage Festival in Macon, Georgia. The Heritage Festival is comprised of high school choirs from the Macon school system and feature African American Spirituals.

#### Awards, Honors, and Recognition

- Dr. Amaechi N. Nwaokoro received a National Excellence in Research Award from Clute Institute, Spring 2016. His article, "Exploratory Study of the Relationship between Poverty and Crimes in Albany/Dougherty County Georgia," was the most referenced article connecting poverty and crime.
- Dr. Devi Akella worked at Birzeit University in the West Bank for a month on a Fulbright Specialist Grant. The Fulbright Specialist was required to review the curriculum, faculty and staff, research and professional experience and suggest steps to overcome any existing limitations which might come in way of AACSB accreditation. The objective was to minimize the risk of accreditation failure in future. The Fulbright Specialist had to work with the Dean, Program Heads and faculty to assess where the college stood on each of the fifteen standards of AACSB and suggest processes to overcome the areas of weaknesses.

#### Counseling and Educational Leadership

- The master's in Educational Leadership (Tier I) has been approved by the Georgia Professional Standards commission to offer the master's in leadership at ASU.
- The School counseling program was approved for accreditation by the Board of Directors of the Council for Accreditation and Related Educational Programs (CACREP) through October 31, 2022.
- The May 2016 issue of Top Counseling Schools Best Value listed Albany State's counseling program in its ranking of top six "Value Counseling Master's Degree in Georgia". Albany State is ranked fourth.
- Angie Gardner, the new principal of the new Commodore Conyers College and Career Academy is a 2015 graduate of the educational leadership specialist program.

#### Teacher Education

- Drs. Rhonda Porter, John Williams, Louise Wrensford, and Li Feng were awarded a grant of nearly \$650,000 to study the impact of placing students in a cohort community in relation to persistence and perseverance in STEM.
- Dorene Medlin was named a Georgia Governor's Teaching Fellow. The fellowship provides a select group of educators expanded opportunities to develop leading edge instructional practices.
- Dr. Tiffany Pogue participated in the Social Justice Learning Community, and Dr. Patricia Jenkins participated in the Digital Divide and Conquer Learning Community.

#### **Summer Learning Academy**

Erica Decuir directed the 2016 Summer Learning Academy, The academy is a STEM-based summer enrichment program that teaches advanced concepts in math and science to rising third, fourth, and fifth graders (ages 7-10). It promotes creative and active learning through science experimentation, math manipulatives, and modeling. The week-long summer program culminates with a science-themed field trip to the GO FISH Education Center in Perry GA to learn how STEM concepts come alive in the real world.



# College of Science and Health Professions

#### Health Disparities Conference

Professors, health professionals, and students gathered in September 2016 to address the issue of health disparities in Southwest Georgia. The research suggests that individuals in the region experience significantly different health outcomes based on a variety factors.

According to Dr. Donyale Childs, assistant professor of nursing and coordinator of the conference, "One of the things that we focus on that we like to bring attention to especially for the young populations are the things that affect them most. Our first presenter focuses specifically on STD's, HIV, sexually transmitted diseases, and that nature which is something at this age in the young population, especially college-age students that think they're invincible."

Dr. Joyce Johnson, Dean of the College of Sciences and Health Professions, developed the theme further. "There's a great disparity in the number of incidences of HIV between the black population and white population. That there are different strategies that can be used and that using evidence-based strategies is the best approach."

"Basically, what we do is showcase the research that is conducted by partner organizations, institutions, and our faculty members, along with their students about different health problems and health disparities that we find within our district." The conference covered a wide variety of topics.

"One of the major things that we've been dealing with for a period of time and is ongoing is cardiovascular disease. We've been working to try to narrow those and to try to find strategies where we can help with prevention and, if not prevention, then management. So that you have less mortality, less morbidity."
