

REQUIREMENTS FOR GRADUATION

The Sociology major must complete the General Education requirement and Area F (12 Semester Hours-SH) of the Sociology Core; this is usually completed by the end of the sophomore year. The next two years are devoted to fulfilling the major course requirements that include 15 SH of prescribed courses and 18 SH of electives. The degree requires 40 SH with a minimum grade of "C" in every major course. In order to earn the B.A. degree in Sociology, the student must:

Fulfill the University's Core Earn a GPA of at least 2.0 Complete the Sociology requirements that include:

- The Sociology Core
- The Required Sociology Courses
- The Elective Sociology Courses
- Complete a total of 125 Semester hours of University Requirements
- Complete 54 Semester hours of Sociology courses
- Complete the MFAT or the GRE (subject)
- Complete the department major exit examination
